



Link To Progress (LTP) is a Dutch founded development organization registered in Uganda and has been in operation since 2009 serving marginalised communities in Northern and Eastern Uganda through an integrated approach, providing services including water, sanitation and hygiene (WASH), quality education, health and nutrition, livelihood and food security and environmental protection. LTP is registered with the Government of Uganda (Reg. No: S.5914/7996) as an independent non-governmental organization.

LTP believes in an integrated approach to development with interventions applied simultaneously and across multiple sectors.

Background

LTP was founded in 2008 by The Good Shepherd Foundation (TGS Netherlands) and Stichting Afrika Projecten (SAP Netherlands). In 2009, it was then registered as a non governmental organisation in Uganda.

Program goal

To contribute towards improved community health and wellbeing of at least 75,000 people from the last mile communities of Uganda through increased access to sustainable water, sanitation and hygiene, education, health and nutrition, livelihood and food security and environmental protection by 2027.

Specific program objectives

1) To contribute to a reduction in the prevalence of water related diseases through increased access to safe water, hygiene and sanitation facilities for 156 rural communities by 2027 for improved health and general wellbeing.

2) To contribute to improved health in schools and communities through menstrual hygiene management, medical camps and strengthening nutrition for 25,000 people by 2027 for a holistic health and nutrition outcomes of children and women.

3) To contribute towards improved quality education through infrastructural development and capacity enhancement for 20,000 children in 20 rural schools by 2027.

4) To improve livelihood resilience of 5,000 small holder farmers, women, youth and people with disabilities to have enough food, cash and income to meet their survival threshold by 2027.

5) To contribute to improved conservation and protection of natural resources and environment in 55 communities and schools by 2027.

Program location

Link To Progress has implemented projects in rural communities in Alebtong, Otuke, Pader, Oyam, Kole, Apac, Nwoya, Dokolo and Amuria. The current interventions are majorly in Lango and Acholi sub-region of Uganda.

Justification for our interventions

- More than 23 million people still do not have access to safe water.
- Uganda has one of the highest youth unemployment in Sub Saharan Africa.
- Almost 4 in 10 Ugandans live on less than \$1 a day
- 78% of Uganda's population is under the age of 30.

Northern and Eastern Uganda, LTP's area of operation are the poorest regions with the largest depth of poverty and worst inequality. This is attributed to the 2 decades of the lord's resistance army insurgencies that forced the largest part of the population to live in displaced people's camps. The war led to loss of lives, increased physical disability, destroyed infrastructures and affected productivity. The high need for social services such as safe and clean water supply, basic quality education, health services and food security among others is enormous in this region. Although the majority of the population has returned to their villages, most of the

infrastructures including water supplies, sanitation facilities, schools and health facilities were destroyed. Reconstruction and rehabilitation of the region calls for collective efforts by both government and private sector, civil society and non governmental organization to contribute and complement each other

LTP interventions

In response to the above, LTP is implementing integrated programs with projects including water sanitation and hygiene, education quality improvement, health and nutrition, livelihood and food security and protection of the environment.

The implementation strategy puts more efforts in the involvement of key stakeholders including the community members to enhance ownership, empowerment and resilience, likewise the existing community structures and government line departments for sustainability of the interventions.

- LTP achievements to date**
- 696 water sources benefiting over 250,000 people.
 - 696 gender sensitive water source committees trained on good WASH practices.
 - 105 infrastructures including classroom blocks, dormitories blocks, teachers houses, latrines, hand washing facilities and institutional energy saving stoves constructed in schools.
 - 47 youths offered scholarships in public universities in Uganda.
 - 10,410 women and men access financial services through the Villages Savings and Loan Association.
 - 204 people from 10 groups are receiving unconditional cash transfers through partnership with 100WEEKS.



LTP partners

LTP works with a number of local and international partners that have been involved in the funding, implementation and quality control of the integrated programs for many years. specifically TGS Water Limited for technical hardware works and WE Consult for technical consultancy services, Medical checks for children for conducting medical camps, 100 weeks Uganda and Cycle Connect Uganda for livelihood and food security.

These long-term collaborations have ensured efficient and effective implementation of donor funds resulting in sustainable projects. LTP has well established community structures on the ground who facilitate community mobilization, sensitization and training in partnership with the local government structures.

These in particular have aspects of community led total sanitation (CLTS) approach for sanitation improvement, the whole school improvement approach for schools, menstrual health and hygiene and other livelihood and sustainability approaches such as the integration of village savings and loan association into the operation and maintenance of facilities.
